BUILDING for the **FUTURE!!**

Bolsover District Council are certainly leading the way when it comes to building new residential properties !!

As part of their commitment to build 400 new homes across the District over the next four year, it won't be long before residents of Shirebrook and Langwith will be the beneficiaries.



The Woodlands phase in Whaley Thorns is well underway and the developers hope to be moving onto the smaller sites in the area over the next few months. Once completed these sites will accommodate 19 new properties.

The ground has been broken on the Portland Road site, in preparation to build 28 (which includes a few on the garage sites on Hereward Close) much needed bungalows.

Add to these the additional fourteen 'apartments' being added to Ashbourne Court and we will see an addibrook and Langwith area.

POLITICAL COMMENT

I'm not going to mention the problems the government has got because you are probably fed up with the coverage already, and also by the time I have put pen to paper anything could have happened. So let's examine the difficulties we



all have with today's political scene.

Normally the Tory mantra is low taxation and low public spend but all that seems to have been forgotten amongst the leadership hopefuls all promising unfunded tax cuts. We all know that forecast income and expenditure is based on assumptions.

But the assumptions need to be realistic and balanced. If not it would probably mean extended borrowing or devaluation. This would lead to more inflation and higher wage demands and hit pensioners and people on fixed incomes the hardest. Cutting tax on fuel and capping prices would lower transport costs and remove the excuse for increasing food prices.

The leadership hopefuls have also already started trying to undermine each other by besmirching their characters. It seems that Mr Johnson's former Special Advisor Dominic Cummings is fuelling the fire. It doesn't look as though he'll rest until he's sorted the nest of vipers.

What a way to carry on; this country deserves a reliable and stable government. Maybe next time.....

The now forgotten Secretary of State Michael Gove has started the 'Great Levelling Up and Local Government Reform Bill of 2022'. This promise of a redistribution of wealth sounds grand until you look at the strings. Mr Gove said you can organise local government as you want but only a combined county council with an elected mayor will bring any extra cash. There is no concrete offer on the table however

Leakey civil servants have said it may be £25 per head of population; that's about £50m over the whole of Derbyshire and Nottinghamshire. It won't even fill the potholes!!!

It will also mean another line on the council tax bill. The ultimate price will be thousands of job losses and a reduction in services. You know how easy it is to get drawn into detail and spin and think arguments make sense until you find that they don't but by then it's too late.

The above is a case in point; the two county leaders and the two city leaders are agreeing to a deal with no detail would you do it?

So what is a Combined Mayoral Authority? The government want to replicate Mayors like the ones in Manchester and West Midlands across England. They want every part of England to get 'London style' powers and Mayor if they wish to.

But what would be the role of an elected Mayor and Combined County Authority and how would that affect representation?

An Elected Mayor would represent over 2million people and the government have stated that extra cash will only be there if there is an election for a Mayor in 2024. The Government are currently considering a proposal to create a Combined Mayoral Authority across Derby, Derbyshire, Nottingham and Nottinghamshire. This would receive new strategic powers in areas such as transport and economic policy and would have greater spending powers.

If the plans go ahead, this new Authority, with an Elected Mayor, will have a population of over 2 million. My concern is that there are risks that this could lead to further reorganisation, potentially leading to the demise of District Councils.

I do not believe this is the right time for change in local government. We are coming out of a global pandemic, we are still dealing with the effects of Brexit, we are in the midst of a potential financial and economic crisis and we have a government in turmoil.

What we need now is stability, not more upheaval. And not an extra line on the Council Tax Bill. So, the progress of the deal will depend upon the Government's ability to manage the situation in hand. I will keep you informed of developments. S.W.F.



WORK UNDERWAY!!

As many of you may have already seen, development of the former 'paddler' area on Portland Road, from an underused recreation area to a much needed residential area has begun.

This is the latest development, which is part of Bolsover District Council's £36million Bolsover Homes project, and will see 24 new one storey dwellings built on land adjacent to Market Close in the town.

Another four additional bungalows will be built on two separate locations at Market Close and Hereward Close, where the garages will be demolished, to make way for the new properties.

District Council Leader, Steve Fritchley said, "We are a growing community and it's very important that we continue to build accommodation for people who need this type of property.

"This is the first time we have built in the centre of Shirebrook and together with the extension to Ashbourne Court, these bungalows demonstrate that we are providing the right properties in the right place.

"Sometimes you only get one chance and you need to make these things happen - you just need the political will to do it. You try and overcome all obstacles that are sometimes placed in your way, and Bolsover has a good track record of doing that, and with the partnership we have with our contractors Woodheads, we take the opportunity whilst it is there.

"These properties are in addition to the 37 already built at Whitwell, 19 which are being built in Whaley Thorns, plus the £6million plus that is being spent on refurbishing and renovating the independent living centres at Clowne, Hillstown and Shirebrook."

The building of these new bungalows along with the extension of Ashbourne Court will create a total of 42 much residential units primarily for our aging population.

As I said in the last issue of the 'Post', we need these types of development, we need to look after our senior residents in the twilight of their years, but it is important to get the balance right !! We don't want our shopping centre to become a retirement centre!!

We have previously reported, that this area of the Town was earmarked for commercial development, but over the years very little interest has been shown for commercial development, and then we had the pandemic!!

Shopping trends have continued to change, sometimes for the worse for places like Shirebrook, but we have to continue to develop and plan for the future as time marches on.

We have an abundance of independent retailers, and I would imagine we have more 'high street supermarkets' than any other places the same size of Shirebrook!!

The Town Centre does need re-vamping to make it more welcoming, and I know plans have been talked about over the years, but everyone needs to work together to make it a reality!!

In the meantime we have to make the best of what we have already got. We have to make a definitive link to the retail outlets on the former mining site with our Town Centre. There needs to be more signage and 'advertising'. We have to let shoppers who visit up the hill know what we have at the bottom of the hill !!

We've all seen the amount of shoppers who visit the former colliery site. We only need to divert some of these shoppers to the town centre and who knows what could happen. More outside investment, more high street names coming in, more choice of retail outlets. Who Knows? But if only we could and if only it would. One thing is for sure everyone would benefit!!

The Langwith Colliery shafts were started in March and May of 1876, by the Sheepbridge Coal and Iron Company, with coal being reached in February (No. 1 shaft) and June (no. 2 shaft) of 1878.

Langwith Colliery finished production on August 4th 1978 because of 'dirty and thinning reserves of coal that were becoming expensive to mine'.

Production of coal in the UK peaked at 292million tonnes in 1913 and by 1920 the industry employed some 1.2million people, 1 in 20 of the UK's workforce

The Shirebrook Colliery Company was founded in 1895 and sinking of the two shafts began in 1896. The shafts were both 18 feet in diameter and it took roughly twelve months before coal was reached at a depth of around 600 yards.

Shirebrook Colliery was the penultimate colliery to close in the North Derbyshire coalfield and finished production on May 7th 1993, thirty years next year!! The headstocks disappeared from our skyline on Monday August 15th 1994 when they were toppled by a controlled explosion.

In 1952, 228million tonnes were produced. 95% from roughly 1,334 deep mines that were operational at the time with the rest from around 92 surface mines

Between 1947 and 1994, some 950 mines were closed by UK governments !!

Up and down the country communities were decimated with the closure of their colliery, but many survived, re-invented themselves and live to fight another day. *Our history mustn't be forgotten!!*

POLICE REPORT

Your Shirebrook Safer Neighbourhood Policing Team led by Sergeant Mark Church, work alongside partnerships / agencies to both target and reduce crime and anti-social behaviour, with the aim of keeping our area safe.

"Now that we are fully free of Covid restrictions the team have enjoyed getting out and about in the community more than ever.

"You may have seen Sam, Jake and Tom at the Christian Centre recently where they chatted with the community at a 'Cuppa with a Coppa' meeting.

"If you have any suggestion as to where you would like to host an 'engagement event', then please drop us a line on our Facebook page and we will try to do some meetings, preferably in the evenings as I'm conscious that not everyone is available in the daytime.

"Between the 18th to the 23rd of July there was a 'National ASB' week. I know that residents in Shirebrook often complain about Anti-Social behaviour, so during the week (the 19th) we made ourselves available on the market square for residents to come and speak about any concerns they may have to us in person.

"Please continue to follow us on Shirebrook SNT Facebook page to see what we are up to as a team.

"On another note, remember to keep your vehicles taxed and insured as the team are still seeing too many uninsured cars on the roads of Shirebrook. If you don't keep your vehicles in good condition and lawful then you are unfairly putting others at risk, and you also run your own risk of having your vehicle seized under Section 165 of the Road Traffic Act 1988.

"Finally, a landlady made one of my team aware of youngsters using fairly good quality fake ID cards to get served alcohol. PC STONE has since visited most shops that sell alcohol along with public

houses in the area to warn them about the issue. If you are a parent then make sure that you have good communication with your children so that with regular contact, you know that your loved ones are safe and well."

Councillor DALE'S DIARY



We live in strange unsettling and unpredictable times!!

An ongoing pandemic, a war, a chaotic government corrupted by lies with a Prime Minster ousted by his own party because of his inability to tell the truth, a cost of living crisis

sending millions of families into poverty with food and fuel prices rising steeply, hospital waiting lists ever on the increase and bed blocking in hospitals putting lives at risk.

If nothing is done by this government many businesses will go under, many people will become unemployed and poverty in this country will hit an all time high as the recession deepens.

We need some stability in government and good policy decisions to reduce inflation and get us out of living in this kafkaesque nightmare and back to some semblance of normality in our lives.

Tax cuts is one of the measures which need to be introduced sooner rather than later to get the economy moving it is important especially for businesses to help stabilise prices and pass this on to their customers helping to prevent inflation spiralling out of control.

The Tory privatisation policy of closing County Council run children's homes and procuring the services of the private sector to look after our children in care has resulted in escalating costs and a heavy financial burden for the County which results in higher council taxes for residents.

After all the private sector runs purely on profit and the more they can make the better for business effectively holding the Council to ransom. The County Council are at last reversing their policy and the latest report from children's services states they are going to acquire and set up two Council owned children's homes instead of relying solely on the private sector.

The Tories at County have made a big mistake in Adult Care by getting rid of the seven Council run residential homes for elderly people. It is more costly now for residents to have to use the private sector, their fees have substantially increased.

Adult Care at the County Council pay the top up fees to the private homes for low income residents and I've been informed the government has made no provision to provide additional funding to help with these increases in the private sector which has left Adult Care under resourced.

They cannot control the fees charged by Private Companies so ultimately the money will have to come from rate payers to fund top up fees through rises in council tax.

I gave £400 towards a family Jubilee celebration event run by Blast at the Hole in the Wall, Shirebrook, £600 to New Houghton Community Hub Jubilee Celebrations Party for children and families in New Houghton and £500.00 to Model Village Residents Association, Shirebrook for their games day Jubilee Celebrations

The Wednesday Club has started up at Shire-brook Leisure Centre and now meets weekly from 12.30pm. It's a group for older people to socialise make new friendships and have a meal together.

I visited them recently and found them a very welcoming friendly group. I am contributing £500 from my Leadership Allowance to help them with start up costs and trips out during the summer. If you're retired and want a change of scene and some good company then go along to the group they'll make you feel very welcome.

I've recently had concerns about two young men 'cold calling' at elderly persons bungalows in Model Village Shirebrook. They were purportedly fundraising for blind children and persuading people to sign up to direct debts for this Charity.

One of my neighbours who is elderly and lives alone was approached by these two young men and they attempted to pressurise her to sign up saying one of her neighbours called Rose had already signed up. The worrying thing is your giving your bank details, name and address to sign up to a direct debit to total strangers. County's Trading Standards advise NEVER BUY GOODS AND SERVICES ON THE DOORSTEP!!

Age Concern and Neighbourhood Watch give some useful advice. Door to door fundraisers need a permit from the local authority whether they are collecting from businesses or home.

'Fake' Charity Collectors pretend they're from a charity and will ask you to donate and will try to obtain your personal details, name and address bank account or credit card details, to use later to order goods or services or loans in your name.

Don't be embarrassed to turn some one away. Don't feel pressurised. Protect yourself and always check their credentials. Phone the Charity Commission on 0300 066 9197 or go online at www.gov.uk/charity-commission to check the charity they represent.

Ring the charity concerned. If they're genuine they won't mind waiting while you check their credentials. Never use contact details cold callers give you to check their credentials. Never sign anything on the spot take time to think.

Doorstep scams can happen to any one so don't be embarrassed to report it. Report it to the police or contact action fraud - Action Fraud 0300 123 2040 www.actionfaud.polic.uk Cont'd on page 15

I'm still encouraging people to go along to the Community Hub in New Houghton on Thursday mornings and see Karen, from the Derbyshire Unemployed Workers Centre, about applying for attendance allowance if they're of pension age and have a long term illness.

Its not means tested. However Karen has also told me that she has increasingly found that pension age people on a low income of less than £200.00 per week are eligible for pension credit and not claiming it.

Pension credit can provide a boost to your income of up to £3,306 a year not only that it gives access to other benefits, Council tax reduction up to £1,000 per annum, free TV licences for over 75 year olds, free dental treatment, vouchers for glasses or contact lenses, cold weather payments, free home insulation and boiler grants, and a range of broadband offers for example BT home essentials £15.00, per month, warm home discount £140.00 per annum and you also may be able to get a discount on your water bill.

Its certainly worth having a benefits check to see if you are eligible. Karen can also be seen during the week at the Derbyshire Unemployed Workers Centre at the old Town Council Offices on Patchwork Row Shirebrook.

Recently four men, the leaders of Derbyshire County, Nottinghamshire County, Nottingham City and Derby City Councils met and made a decision to submit a bid to government to create one huge

combined authority with a mayor. They also invited Leicestershire County and Leicester City Councils to join them but they declined and decided to keep their two tier system.

There was no consultation about these plans with any one, it was all done in secret. We live in a democracy and the rate payers who fund these services have a right to be consulted on how the money is spent and of any changes in the structures of the authority.

I asked Peter the head of Finance at County as to how the Council was going to finance this Mayoral Combined Authority. He said they would use Council Taxes, contributions from the District Councils, some additional grants and of course they would only employ a small number of well paid staff to run it.

The problem with a Mayor and four combined authorities is that the power ends up in the hands of one person and a small select cabinet which results in the man in the street no longer having a voice. In the meantime one of the authorities Nottingham City has fallen into special measures which means they're in serious financial difficulties and the government takes over and runs the Council. But Derbyshire County Council are still going ahead with their plans for the formation of a combined mayoral authority.

Is this a prudent decision? It's like forming a business partnership with a bankrupt partner. Cllr Christine Dale - 07811 995612

OLD SHIREBROOK!!

I received several calls and had several chats regarding 'old' Patchwork Row that we featured in the last issue of the Post.

Memories of the old dance halls, before my time I'd like to say, the shops that used to be on Patchwork Row and what was the old church that used to stand were the Coop car park now takes up.

I love talking and learning about old Shirebrook, they should put in on the curriculum of our local schools, and the old church was the Bourne Methodist Church which was built back in 1901.

I know many of our older readers will well remember Ron Scruby's detailed 'plans' we featured in past issues. Drawings that showed every property, and who lived there, in the late 1930's, in the town centre.


But to refresh your memories and to let newcomers to Shirebrook see how parts of Shirebrook used to be, I thought I'd reproduce what we did back in which issue 76 of the 'Post'

The sections opposite show how the area between Main Street to Carter Lane and from the rear of Byron Street to the properties on Victoria Street where back in those days.

To the left and along Main Street opposite the Great Northern we had a row of shops that included Latham's and Packman's

A little further down was the Roxy, the former 'Town Hall' which was built in 1909. The Roxy was one of two cinemas in Shirebrook, the other being the Empire up on Station Road. Opposite, on the other side of Main Street stood the library, and then, along Main Street and King Edward Street, came an assortment of shops along Shirebrook's former high street.


To the rear of the Great Northern and the Roxy a row of cottages once straddled 'Flash Hill' (Division Road), which was once part of the



'turnpike', a former coach road that ran from Mansfield to Rotherham, and in line with them towards Patchwork Row, stood Charlie Faulkner's Elite Dance Hall.

The Elite was later used as a snooker hall and children's play centre before its demolition to make way for the current pharmacy.

Along Patchwork Row, after the shops, you can see where the Salvation Army, the Bourne Methodist Church and the Central Hall Ballroom once stood.

The QUEEN'S PLATINUM JUBILEE

The first weekend in June saw churches across the country celebrate the occasion of the Platinum Jubilee of the Queen.

This is the first time in our history that a monarch has celebrated 70 years on the throne. For most of us, she has been there our whole lives – a reassuring presence on the national and the world stage.

On her 21st birthday in 1947, Princess Elizabeth made a vow, that her whole life, whether it be long or short, should be devoted to our service. She followed this by saying it was a vow that she would not be able to fulfil alone – she asked for God to help her make good her vow and for God to bless all who shared in it with her.

It was less than five years later that, at the age of 25 and with two small children, she became Queen on her father's death. For this reason, the Jubilee must be a bitter-sweet one for her: as a daughter devoted to her father, the anniversary marks his death as well as a time for celebration.

In her first Christmas broadcast in December 1952, she asked people, whatever their religion to pray for her on her coronation day, which took place in June of the following year at Westminster Abbey as she was crowned and anointed with the oil of Chrism as our queen.

This is similar to the signing with the oil that many of us have seen when we have attended baptism ceremonies.

In the years since, the Queen has often spoken about how much her faith means to her and how she follows the example of Jesus in her life – particularly in her Christmas broadcasts over the years.

In June, the Archbishop of Canterbury presented the Queen with the Canterbury Medal in an audience at Windsor Castle to mark her 70 years of service as Supreme Governor of the Church of England.

Earlier this year on the anniversary of her accession, she said: "It gives me pleasure to renew to you the pledge I gave in 1947 that my life will always be devoted to your service."

I'm sure that even people who are not supporters of the Royal Family will agree that this is something she has done unfailingly and will continue to do so to the best of her ability.

HOW DO I?

Book a christening or a wedding in church? To book a christening, also known as a baptism, or a wedding, come along to Holy Trinity Church on the first Monday of each month between 7pm and 8pm — we will be happy to help you book and make the arrangements for your special event.

There is no charge for christenings in church. If you are booking a christening for your child, it doesn't matter if you aren't married or if you haven't been christened yourself.

Hear my banns read? Banns are read for three weeks before weddings in church at our usual church service at 11am on Sunday mornings. When you book your wedding, you will be told on which Sundays the banns will be read. It's a special time and one that you can share with the church community.

Arrange a funeral in church? To arrange a funeral, please speak to your funeral director. They will make the arrangements for the time in church and for an officiant to lead the service. They will explain the costs involved and help you choose things like hymns for the service.

Attend a church service ? Services at Holy Trinity are held each Sunday at 11am. Everyone is welcome to attend – please feel free to come along.

If you would like to take part in our online worship, search for Sunday Together on Facebook. A short service is held every Sunday morning at 8.30am – you can either watch live or watch later to suit you.

CONGRATULATIONS to ELLIE

This month, our curate, Rev Ellie Launders-Brown was ordained as a priest. Ellie joined us a year ago when she had first been ordained as a deacon.

Following her ordination as a priest, Ellie will be able to lead Holy Communion services and christening services.

PALS which stands for 'Physical Activity and Lifestyle Support', is a continuation of

- Capability to change
- Motivation to change
- Opportunity to change

Alongside these, there are also five key factors that have an impact on the above: Age, Gender, Socio-economic, Ethnicity and Disability / Condition.

A **PALS** co-ordinators role is to help join the dots as there are many agencies and organisations working hard to provide services to the people within their community, all with the aim of improving overall community health and wellbeing.

They will create a package / personal plan to enable a path to a more active and healthier lifestyle working with other agencies to navigate through what is available for the individual or family.

Self referral forms are available from Council offices and locally from Shirebrook Leisure Centre. So if you feel that the **PALS** programme could be for you, pick one up, fill it in and send it off, and a **PALS** co-ordinator will then contact you to talk about what support is available for you.

Alternatively contact **Archie Rowbottom**, your **PALS** co-ordinator, via Shirebrook Leisure Centre, who holds classes at the Leisure Centre and at the Arc in Clowne, on: **01623 748313**.

The Wellness Programme also run a 'low impact' exercise class run by experienced and qualified instructors. It is a class of various exercises for people who are looking to get back into light exercise, or if a beginner or returning from illness or injury.

It is a group but allowances are made to accommodate all abilities, and is designed to improve both physical and mental wellbeing.

Come along and give it a go. The class runs on a Tuesday at Shirebrook Leisure Centre from 1.00 to 2.00pm

COMMUNITY GROUPS

Before the pandemic we had an abundance of 'community groups' that met on a weekly basis. However the past two years have seen quite a few groups scale back their activities or completely fold due to lack of interest, increasing costs or for fear of going out.

Bolsover District Leader and local Councillor Steve Fritchley has said that more needs to be done to help these groups and he is a big believer that community and voluntary groups are the heartbeat of the area, but he also believes more should be done to help them.

Steve said: "Community groups have been the mainstay of local communities for years now. We used to have amateur dramatics, bingo clubs galore and model aircraft groups in every corner of the District, but they have dwindled to just a handful over time and if we are not careful we will soon end up with none.

"These weekly social groups can often be the only time someone gets out the house and talks to another person so we have to take responsibility and do all we can. I am really worried that if something isn't done, then there won't be any of these groups and social activities in the future.

"Why, when so many people want to be part of a community, are places and groups that facilitate community connection dying out. More needs to be done to help them. In Shirebrook and Langwith the councils provide free room hire to groups which can often mean the difference between surviving and folding, so why can't other areas?"

Editor: Before the pandemic we had local groups meet at Shirebrook Village Hall, Langwith Village Hall, the Salvation Army, the Hole-in-the-Wall on Carter Lane and at the Library.

Some of these have sadly fallen by the wayside but others are back up and running and are always on the lookout for new members.


VENUE FOR ALL OCCASIONS !!
